THE RULES OF SCHOOL AND WORK

As we move towards the end of the school year we would like to remind students, families and local employers that students are legally required be at school. Year 12's – until their work is complete, Year 11's – until the end of Week 7 and all subjects are completed and Year 10's until the end of week 8 unless SBAT (School Based Apprenticeship and Traineeship) or Work Experience is negotiated. Students leaving school early for paid work, or missing school all together, leaves employers, families and the school open to legal and safety issues plus the possibility of a government fine.

If you are a parent or an employer and are expecting to hire a student during school hours as part of an approved program, please ensure that the school is advised and an exemption form is filled out.

Being Paid During School Hours

It is a requirement of the *Education Act 1972* that a child of compulsory school age (between 6 and 16 years of age) cannot be employed during the hours 8.45am to 3.05pm (at Tumby Bay Area School) on a school day.

Nor are they allowed to work at a time that is likely to render them unfit to attend school e.g. working late at night or early in the morning.

Please note, students above the age of compulsion (17 and above) are also obligated to attend school if they are enrolled at Tumby Bay Area School. However, they are eligible to leave school at this age to take on full-time work.

Breaches of the *Education Act 1972* would include:

Drawing a taxable wage in a family business during school hours.

Leaving school early (before 3.05pm) to start work at a local business.

Drawing a wage during senior school home study times.

Using a work experience program to access paid work, including through an existing SBAT.

Under the Education Act, parents and employers could be prosecuted and fined as much as \$5000 in each instance.

Work Experience

Students must not undertake more than 40 days of work experience within a single school year, and must not be placed with the same employer for more than 10 days per year.

Workplace Learning Agreement forms are required to be submitted one week prior to the work placement's starting date.

These guidelines apply to all students undertaking work experience linked to a SACE subject.

Students undertaking a VET course may be required to undertake a greater number of days as their course may include Structured Workplace Learning (SWL). All arrangements must be negotiated with the school and the VET course providers.

An employer should not rely upon a student undertaking work experience in terms of a role or duties. For instance, if a student is attending a local business every Friday for 10 weeks and has duties specifically assigned to them, then they are considered an employee under legal definitions. This situation would suggest an opportunity for an SBAT.

School Based Apprenticeships and Traineeship (SBAT)

Students undertaking an SBAT are required to attend school as negotiated and agreed upon by student, parent, employer, school and Australian Apprenticeship Support Network (SBAT) provider.

Any variation to the agreed working hours of an SBAT must be re-negotiated and agreed upon by all parties. These changes must not compromise the student's SACE completion or SBAT pathway.

Students who fail to meet their school attendance and assessment requirements risk the success and completion of their SBAT and SACE.

Dear parent/caregiver,

On November 16, the Commissioner of Police, acting in his role as the State Coordinator responding to the COVID-19 pandemic, announced the Emergency Management (Education and Early Childhood Settings Vaccination) (COVID-19) Direction 2021.

Under this Direction, COVID-19 vaccinations will be mandatory for all people who work or volunteer at our school/ preschool/children's centre, except those who have a [medical exemption](#) endorsed by the Chief Public Health Officer. This includes:

All of our staff and contractors

Anyone who visits our schools/preschool/children's centre for work purposes

Our Governing Council members

All volunteers and parent helpers (people who assist with reading, camps, excursions, canteen, fundraising etc).

Under this Direction, all of the above-mentioned people must receive at least 1 dose of a Therapeutic Goods Association (TGA) approved COVID-19 vaccination and a booking to receive a second dose by 11.59pm on 10 December 2021, which is the last day of term.


The Direction does not apply to students, parents dropping off or picking up children, attending parent teacher interviews, events or similar, as long as they are not working or volunteering at the event and COVID safe measures are followed.
