Student Free Day

Our Student Free Day on Monday allowed staff to continue our improvement work as a whole staff. We built our capacity in understanding the specific demands of curriculum content whilst ensuring we track and monitor student progress against these demands. This involved deep analysis of different forms of data to build our clarity of where our students are at. This is exciting work, as we continue to ensure we are providing students with high quality curriculum delivery pitched at their level.

Primary

The most rewarding component of our jobs is seeing evidence our students are progressing their learning. Since the last newsletter multiple students have visited the front office, glowing with pride to share the great work they have been doing in class. Teachers are doing core work to deeply analyse the demands of the curriculum to strengthen their Learning Intentions and Success Criteria. There is no doubt this work is having the intended impact as our students are increasing their ability to articulate their learning and what their individual progressive steps are.

Senior Secondary

When you receive the semester 1 report (tomorrow) for your Senior Secondary student, please take note of the captions near the results for some of the Year 11 and 12 reports.

"*Subject to moderation*" means that this grade could be changed by the SACE Board during their process of moderation, confirming our students' grades.

Where subjects are a full year (20 credit) course, the grade adjacent to the caption, "*interim grade – full year subject*" is only an indication of how the student is tracking at this point in the course.

Wellbeing Update—Resilience Project

Students have spent the latter part of the term focusing on Empathy during our Wellbeing for Learning lessons.

Empathy is our ability to put ourselves in the shoes of others to feel and see what they do. We practise this through being kind and compassionate towards other people.

Brain imaging data shows that being kind to others registers in the brain as more like eating chocolate than like fulfilling an obligation to do what's right (e.g., eating brussel sprouts)!

Research shows that practising empathy, such as performing acts of kindness, taps into our brain's 'mirror neurons', builds compassion and our behaviour becomes more social and community-based.

Here's an activity to practise empathy and kindness:

- * Reflect on someone in your life who could benefit from an act of kindness today. It could be a friend who would love some affirmation about their work, your pet who deserves an extra treat, or a family member who would love a phone call or text message.
- * Make a plan for who you are going to show an act of kindness to, and what you are going to do.
- * If you want to add accountability to your plan, share it with someone else and encourage them to do the same thing.
- * Follow up with each other in a few days' time, to ask how it went!

Our Kindness Committee has also been active around the school, identifying those students who treat others with kindness. Certificates have been given to students who are showing acts of kindness in our yard.



WHAT IS LINO PRINTING?

Lino printing, also known as lino cutting, is a printmaking technique that dates back to the early 20th century. It's an effective method for creating multiple prints of an artistic piece using linoleum. Students used sharp carving tools to carve the lino and were encouraged to consider their use of line.







Eligibility for preschool

Children are entitled to access 4 Terms (1 year) of Government Preschool in the year before they start school.

The mid-year intake will begin for preschool from 2023. This means for 2023, children who turn 4 years of age:

- ⇒ • Before 1 May continue to start preschool at the beginning of the year.
- ⇒ • From 1 May to 31 October can commence preschool at the mid year intake at the start of Term 3 of that year.
- ⇒ Regardless of whether your child starts at the beginning of the year or through a mid year intake they will undertake 4 Terms of Preschool.
- ⇒ •Children who turn 4 years after 31st October will be eligible to start preschool at the beginning of the following year.

If you are uncertain about the best time for your child to start Preschool or feel your child may benefit from starting preschool later, please contact Ginny McTaggart on 0403080245.
