Leadership Report

TBAS IMPROVEMENT JOURNEY

We have been doing lots of exploration currently at TBAS about our purpose piece — "Why we do what we do" and I have shared aspects of the following statement in various documents and iterations. However, I wanted to be really explicit so all of you as members of our wider school community have a clear and concise understanding on where we are currently in our improvement journey.

Vision of TBAS: Students are well prepared for a changing world in which they view learning as a means of creating better life opportunities.

Purpose of TBAS: To work with our school community to equip students with the knowledge, skills and capabilities they need to prosper and thrive in their community and future world.

Guiding principles and success measures: Our aim is to have students authentically engaged in learning by knowing what they are learning and why. We want students to know how to be successful in their learning, the scaffolds they will need to access this and to reflect upon the learning they have done. Students will be reflecting on the spiral of inquiry questions to give us feedback on how successful we are being with this.

We come to these statements based upon our narrative of our journey of lifting achievement at Tumby Bay Area School. Our data story demonstrates the key improvement strategies that have been put into place and are having an impact on our students. We therefore begin the next iteration of our journey of adding equity to excellence. Ensuring we facilitate and deliver quality curriculum is the way we will do this for all of our students. We are utilising the movement of LISC (Learning Intentions and Success Criteria) as we know that teacher clarity, through learning intentions and success criteria, have the impact we are desiring for all of our students. We are curious about how well we do this at TBAS and are aiming to embed this strategy into our teaching and learning cycles. This is our current Leadership inquiry focus with our staff and students.

EXTERNAL REVIEW

We have a new date for our next review which will occur during Week 8 of Term 3. We will work towards this process and keep Governing Council and parents informed about our lines of inquiry, the process and our progress as it gets a bit closer.

QUESTACON SCIENCE CIRCUS

On Monday Week 3 Primary students were entertained with the wonder of science, through the travelling Questacon Science Circus. Students were a part of learning about the viscosity of liquids and the science behind the strength of various shapes in the design and build of bridges.

Naylene, Emma, Maddox and Joel made lemon myrtle and_wattle seed scones and pikelets on Tuesday as a way to celebrate National Reconciliation week. The whole school got to enjoy the delicious flavours of the unique cooking ingredients.

Healthy Banana and Wattle Seed Cake

100g margarine

½ cup sugar

2 eggs

2 ripe bananas, mashed

2 cup SR flour, sifted

1Tbsp wattle seed

½ cup milk

Method

Preheat oven to 180C. Line a 20 x 10cm loaf tin with



baking paper.

Beat the margarine and sugar until creamy, then add the eggs, beat well.

Add the banana and wattle seed, then fold in the flour and milk.

Spoon the mixture into the prepared tin and bake in the oven for about 30min or until skewer comes out clean.

Lemon Myrtle Scones Serves: approx 12 small scones

230g SR flour

1 1/2 tsp ground lemon myrtle

100ml cream

100ml milk

Milk for glazing

Method

Preheat oven to 220C. Line a tray with baking paper.

Mix the dry ingredients together, then add the milk and cream and mix together.

Knead lightly then pat into shape, about 3cm high. Cut into shapes or use a scone cutter.

Place scones on the tray and brush with milk.

Bake for 10-12 mins. Serve warm, with jam and cream or butter.

I found it quite engaging with the different activities. It was fun and I learnt about Aged Care and how it can be studied locally. – Mitch Bellenger




